

COMMUNITY HALL DIALOGUE 2022

Preface

In the 1930s, Councillors & Parishioners created a hall that served our community for nearly 90 years until it was condemned as structurally unsafe in 2017. Since then people, who live in Poundstock Parish, have had to rely on properties owned by others, and there is presently no space that can be called our Community Hall.

As part of an ongoing dialogue with parishioners on this subject, Poundstock Parish Councillors agreed to ask residents to answer three key questions related to the idea of a community hall:

1. What does the idea of a community hall mean to you?
2. Who could benefit from a community hall?
3. What sort of activities could you imagine happening in, or connected to, a community hall?

During the summer of 2022, a team of Councillors canvassed the entire parish: knocking on doors and putting question cards through letter boxes. The Parish Council also liaised with Poundstock's Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) working group so that the three questions were included in the Parish's NDP Survey, which allowed for more responses to be gathered electronically and also through physical responses connected that survey. This resulted in nearly 200 responses being recorded.

Councillors from the Community Hall Committee then took responses collected in these ways and compiled this document, which we hope serves as a snapshot of parishioners' attitudes towards the idea of a Community Hall in 2022.

DIALOGUE QUESTION AND ANSWERS

1. What does the idea of a community hall mean to you?

- A place to hold community events, meetings and regular groups. To enable parishioners to meet regularly.
- A hall open for community use owned by the parish.
- Somewhere locals can use for local events, nursery, Scouts, Cubs, Guides, etc.
- A meeting place.
- Somewhere local without going into Bude.
- A local events location.
- Where neighbours get together if they wish – good for people who are on their own.
- Unfortunately, people rarely communicate and with a low population and nearness to Bude, we think it is doomed. Who would use it? The Gildhouse has problems with helpers.
- Somewhere the local community can use for various events, training and celebration.
- It depends on size and what it is used for.
- Would be good for the community and local children.
- Exactly what it says; the bring all the community together.
- It doesn't mean anything to us – why can't the Gildhouse be used?
- The social centre of the whole community.
- To be honest, I don't think I would use it a lot, but do see the benefit for others.

- The old one got run down – better to have a playpark.
- It would be good to have a community hall in the village. Hopefully it would bring people together.
- A sense of 'together'.
- It would be good.
- It's a focal point for community togetherness.
- Somewhere the community can meet and hold functions together.
- A get-together for the local residents.
- A social gathering.
- Not for young adults as Bude would offer better facilities.
- We have the Gildhouse which could be used more, but there is a problem with cars and numbers of people who could use it.
- Something that could be good for Widemouth Bay because we really have nothing here
- A central meeting place
- A place where you could approach community support people, such as a PCSO
- A central point for us to come together.
- An extremely good idea: the community could become a 'proper' community.
- A social centre for the community.
- A meeting place.
- A place where anyone in the community would have access to and a need, i.e. for meetings, etc.
- It would revitalise Poundstock.

- Somewhere for local people to meet.
- Outdated building, not used by anyone apart from parish councillors.
- The parish council need to start looking after the community before they even think this.
- I struggle to understand how 'community' and 'parish council' go together.
- A place for the community to congregate for events, activities, and meetings.
- A place the community can use to improve wellbeing.
- Somewhere for the community to meet and socialise and take part in a variety of activities.
- A place for multi-use activities for the benefit of the local community.
- A subsidised meeting place which is accessible to all members of the community.
It should be affordable to all. A focal point for parish events, both formal and informal.
- Somewhere for community activities and a place to rent for parties/family gatherings.
- An essential area where the community can meet socially in a fast eroding spirit of community (holiday homes, second homes). It is more essential than ever.
- A getting together of elderly people. Functions like exercise, yoga, etc.
- A space people know they can use for small or big functions – a community resource and space at reasonable rates.
- A place where the community can meet, where events can be held, where parish issues can be debated.
- A good place to socialise and meet other locals.

- It's a focal point for the community to meet and enjoy the amenities.
- Somewhere where local groups can meet. Availability for private hire. For the use of charities.
- As we will probably never use it, not a lot. We are not local to the area – go back to our roots in Newquay.
- A good idea for the years to come.
- An information hub where you can meet locals and offer DIY trades, etc.
- It would be the centre for all Poundstock parish activities and draw the community together.
- An excellent idea and one very much needed – having lived in Widemouth Bay for 35 years the idea of some community spirit to link the parish is very exciting.
- A central meeting point of the community; something that draws us together: Poundstock village, Bangors, Widemouth, etc.
